The "Virtual Docent" program is 80% complete with remote fans, A/C, and lights. We're still working on the music and completing the videos describing all the instruments, memorabilia, and exhibits to complete our "Program"!

For those of you who look at Facebook, the PLCTM is now active with pictures and Videos; and, we WELCOME "Likes" and "Comments" from you all once you review the

site.

We spent much of May working to entertain and feed the Pardubicka Muzika, a group of 17 students ages 16 to 24 traveling from Prague to tour "Czechxas" performing in Seaton, Ennis, La Grange and Houston, Texas before heading back to Czech Republic. They are a brass band and extremely entertaining. We served some Texas comfort food, green beans, mashed potatoes, meatloaf, and beer bread prior to their performance at the Schmid Amphitheater on a steamy, Memorial Day....Look more to see some of Carol's pictures.

The PLCTM has a new internal look as Virginia Leech asked us to take on her family's original "Frank's Place Bar" that was located in the La Grange town square. It was housed at the TCHCC but not showcased and in need of maintenance. Our board unanimously agreed to add it to the PLCTM. We worked with TCHCC to get approval to move it to our museum and include it as a new exhibit and keep it on loan for at least 10 years or longer if they cannot provide a facility for it. Rudy was a life-long member of Holy Rosary Catholic Church including his early schooling. A devout Catholic, Rudy took pride his entire life in attending church at least four times each

week and always on Sunday. At Holy Rosary, he served as an usher for many decades. He was an avid domino player, always willing to join a game of "straight" or "42" even in the last months of his life. He enjoyed camping with his favorite destination being Lake Somerville.

Rudy spent a large portion of his life in route sales, starting by helping his dad deliver bread for Sunbeam bread company and culminating with spending over 40 years owning his Morton Foods distributorship. He could be seen all over Fort Bend county delivering snack foods and restaurant supplies in his white delivery truck always ready with a wave or honk of the horn to passersby. Later in his life he would brighten the days of bus riders requiring assistance on Lamar Consolidated buses and always treasured the interaction with the students and their parents. Work never seemed like work for Rudy when he got to laugh and joke with his many friends and customers.

After retiring, Rudy and his wife Lucille pursued their passion for polka dancing traveling all over southeast Texas to dances with friends. They even spent a few years as Polka royalty, rising to be Prince and Princess of the P.O.L.K. of A. chapter to which they belonged.

Rudy is survived by his former wife of more than 50 years and compassionate caregiver of the last five years, Lucille Antrich. He is also survived by his three children: Greg Antrich and his wife Kim, Darrell Antrich and his wife Julie, and Jennifer McSorley and her husband Mike. He is survived by his three sisters, Bernie Dyer, Joyce Felcman and her husband Cotton, and Debbie Mayes. Constance was preceded in death by her parents, Frank and Vlasta Cernosek of La Grange.


